The Tourism Development Corporation (TDC), incorporated as a non-profit organisation in 1987, functions as an excellent catalyst for tourism development in Barbados. By directing member contributions to carefully selected tourism marketing and product enhancement projects, the TDC offers an excellent opportunity for public-spirited, commercial enterprises to contribute to the positive growth and sustainability of the island's tourism industry.

In co-operation with the Barbados Hotel & Tourism Association, the Barbados Tourism Authority and the Ministry of Tourism, the TDC promptly responds to the industry's needs, supporting results-oriented projects that

will enhance Barbados' tourism product and increase foreign exchange earnings. TDC's Directors and Project Committee Members are senior business executives who serve voluntarily in order to stimulate ideas and provide commercial insight for the development of the tourism industry.

The members of the TDC are considered to be its stakeholders who provide the organisation's working capital and resources. While the TDC's stakeholders do not receive the traditional dividend return on their investment, the TDC places a high priority on providing its members with a return through the growth of the tourism industry which is essential if we are to sustain our accustomed standard of living in Barbados.

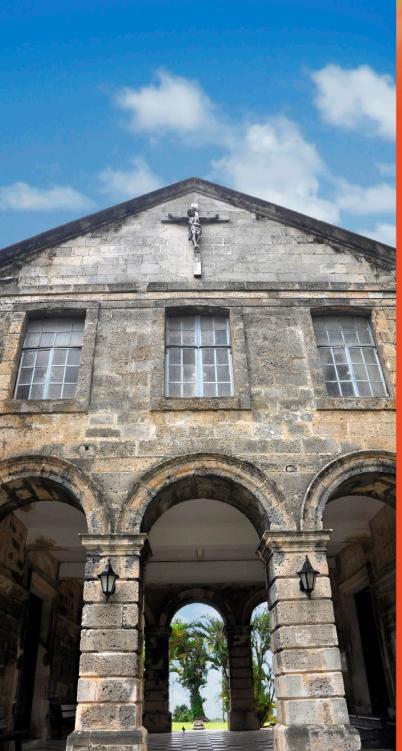
TDC's role as a financial contributor to the overall development of the Barbados tourism industry is supported by the Government of Barbados, who encourages businesses to contribute to the organisation by allowing contributors to claim 150% of their annual contribution as an expense for corporate income tax purposes.

TDC also has a 'Special Projects' facility that allows non-member organisations to contribute funds towards specific tourism-related projects supported by the TDC and benefit from the 150% tax facility.

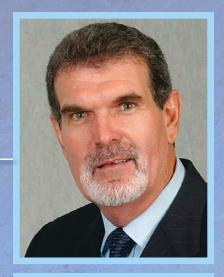

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

ChairmanG. Anthony King



During the Financial Year ended March 2014, Barbados' tourism industry continued to be under strain with a reported overall decline in total long-stay visitor arrivals of 5.2% for 2013. All of our major source markets such as the USA, Canada and UK produced fewer guests. Notably, the United States declined 7.8% and Canada was down 6.7%. For the first quarter of 2014 the figures were mixed with the USA and Canada still negative while UK and Europe recorded gains over Q1 2013 but overall, arrivals were down. One encouraging area in 2013 was cruise tourism which reflected an increase in total cruise passengers of 10.2% and a 4.4% increase in cruise calls; however the figures returned for Q1 2014 are below those of Q1 2013.

At the time of writing, the outlook seems somewhat brighter according to feedback from the industry with improved bookings for the upcoming winter over the 2013/14 winter period. The enlarged Casuarina property should also be back on stream in early 2015.

In March 2014 the British Chancellor announced that the Air Passenger Duty (APD) would be reformed to result in reduced rates from April 2015 and this news was welcomed as the region has been lobbying for this for quite some time. More however needs to be done for Barbados to win over increased holiday makers from the UK, given the many choices they have of destinations and the improvements in the UK economy which fuels their ability for holiday travel.

It is unfortunate that over recent years the island has seen a significant fall in room stock with the available rooms in operation reported to be now about 5000. This

has notably impacted airlift, revenue and employment for the sector. Decreased airlift to the island has also occurred with the notable loss of the American Airlines flight from New York. News reports of new investment and construction which will rebuild our room stock and improve our product offering are encouraging but still await finalisation before action is invoked.

Also worthy of note, was the announcement in July 2013 by the Minister of Tourism, The Hon. Richard Sealy, of a ten-point plan intended to turn the sector around. This plan featured land-tax, electricity and water rebates, a programme to encourage hotels to implement renewable energy and water management processes, plans to strengthen event-based tourism and credit vouchers for British visitors affected by the APD among other initiatives. At this time we do not have full details of the implementation of the various elements of this plan or the associated impact thereof.

Another significant development occurring in this last financial year, was the announcement by the Minister of Tourism that our major industry partner, the Barbados Tourism Authority would be restructured and divided into two entities - namely the 'Barbados the Tourism Product Authority' and the 'Barbados Tourism Marketing Inc'. This, together with insufficient funding, has nevertheless brought delays in new marketing programmes which are very much needed.

TDC Initiatives

TThe TDC has however continued to carry out its role of providing financial support for projects that seek to either improve our local facilities or attract new visitors.

Further to the Tourism Audit on the state of local attractions commissioned last financial year, the TDC acted upon the significant information garnished from this report and committed a significant amount of funds to restorative and development work needed by the attractions. We also contracted a Product Development Consultant to ensure that the funds were appropriately distributed and applied as warranted.

Support for events has also been important and this year it was recognised by the Board that some of the project managers, especially those with repeat events, appeared to need additional marketing and implementation assistance as other avenues of sponsorship were often reduced. To this end the organization has started to offer some level of consultant support to a few select projects. This is a new area for the TDC and we are collecting a listing of potential consultants specializing in the areas of Project Management, Event Planning etc, with the view of creating a data base for future reference.

Industry Collaborations

The Barbados Hotel & Tourism Association

The TDC continued to work very closely with the BHTA. The TDC participated in the BHTA's Marketing and Product Development Committee meetings which were held in July, August and September. These meetings covered a variety of topics including presentations on the Rihanna Campaign, Travel apps, airlift support, Book Barbados Now and Barbados Island Inclusive Programme. As per usual the TDC was able to join

forces with the BHTA to ensure funding requirements were met for various tourism projects, a few of which are mentioned in the Committee Report.

Ministry of Tourism's 'Host Programme'

Mr. Mark Thompson, Chairman of the Project Assessment Committee continued to attend the Task Force meetings of the "Tourism Host Programme" on TDC's behalf. The Programme is to provide training to tourism practitioners and the wider service sector and to establish a welcoming environment for visitors to be truly treated as guests of the island. It is set to be launched in the latter half of 2014 and will be funded by government and administered by the Ministry of Tourism.

The Barbados Tourism Authority

There were no major joint projects between the BTA and the TDC this year, however the organisation did collaborate and attend meetings to discuss some sports tourism events; and once again the TDC provided sponsorship for the Barbados Food and Wine & Rum Festival. As mentioned earlier this institution was reorganised during the year.

The Royal Barbados Police Force Video Surveillance Project

With respect to the CCTV project, the TDC attended meetings with members of the RBPF and visiting representatives of a proposed analytics software vendor to discuss a proposal by the RBPF to expand and improve the effectiveness of the force's capabilities with the CCTV system. This software is intended to reduce the dependence on manpower to monitor the

existing and new CCTV coverage, improving the ability to detect incidents by tracking specific parameters. In tandem with this proposal the TDC was contacted by the Barbados Tourism Investment Inc. with regard to a joint project to extend the CCTVs to the West Coast and Warrens areas.

Special Projects Facilities

The TDC continued to assist with its Special Project Facilities, designed to offer incentives for the collection of project funds. Notably the TDC was pleased to administer significant activity with the disbursement of funds for the QEH Hospital with over \$400,000 being given to worthwhile medical causes in this financial period. The TDC was also able to obtain permission from the Ministry of Finance to facilitate the collection of funds for a special heritage project.

Membership Contributions and Project Expenditures

For the year ended March 31, 2014, TDC membership contributions were approximately \$116 thousand higher than for the prior year. However, a number of contributions attributable to the prior year were received after the close of the 2012/13 year and, as contribution revenue is recognised on a cash received basis, higher receipts were recorded for the 2013/14 year. On whole however, contributions have been reasonably stable over the two years. Interest earned on deposits was marginally higher although deposit interest rates have been declining somewhat.

By the close of the financial year under review, the funds committed for development and promotional expenditure stood at some \$144 thousand higher than at the close of the prior year. New commitments agreed during the year were also higher but the write-back

of unutilised commitments resulted in a net charge for the year of \$497.7 thousand versus \$579.1 for the year before.

Funds held in cash and on deposit which are available for the TDC's purposes stood at \$4.4 million at year-end, compared to just under \$4.1 Million which was available at the close of the prior year.

Conclusion

I wish to thank the members of the Board for their diligent work throughout the year. Special thanks are extended to Mr. Denis Roach who resigned from the Board effective August 31st, 2013 to pursue his business interests. We thank Denis for extended years of dedicated service on our Project Assessment Committee and to the Board. We welcomed Mr. Frere Delmas of Massy Barbados to our Board in January this year.

Sincerest thanks are extended to our Project Assessment Committee headed by Mr. Mark Thompson who continued his duties as Committee Chairperson during this period. This dedicated group of individuals continues to volunteer their valued time to discuss and evaluate incoming projects and make the necessary recommendations to the Board.

Subsequent to the close of the financial year, our Executive Officer Ms. Dawn Franklin resigned after some 2 years of proficient and attentive service with effect from August 29th, 2014. We wish Dawn the very best in her new endeavours. In her place, we welcome Mrs. Natalie de Caires - Natalie has worked with the TDC before and we are pleased to have her back with the organisation.

Finally, I extend sincerest appreciation to our members for your support and financial contributions. The TDC is very appreciative of your continued support in spite of the ongoing local recession, as this indicates your faithful dedication to the work of this organization.

COMMITTEE REPORT

ChairpersonMark Thompson



Again a significant percentage of this financial year's funding was directed towards sports tourism activities which accounted for almost 25% of the funds committed, however the vast majority of funds went towards Attraction Development (39%). The remainder of the funds was disbursed to heritage, promotional activities, epicurean, meeting and incentives, crime prevention and eco-tourism.

Given the current economic climate, it was of immense importance to focus on upgrading and keeping current the appearance of many of our attractions included in the Tourism Attraction Audit Phase 2. The Audit commissioned by the TDC and administered by the BHTA last year, lead to the execution of the scope of works carried out and monitored by Sharon Banfield-Bovell contracted as our Product Development Consultant. Funding and implementation of project activities for the following properties were carried out:

Nearly \$200,000 in funding was allocated to address a number of issues including directional and interpretive signage, pathway, parking area, footpath, handrail,

bridge, and ramp renovations; and the purchase of pumps, plants, benches, garbage bins, ground lights, etc. Additionally, the Consultant was also engaged to work with the Barbados National Trust on developing a Strategic Marketing Plan for some of their properties.

Heritage

In addition to the heritage properties touched by the aforementioned Attractions audit, the TDC once more partnered with the Barbados Garrison Historical Consortium as the main sponsor of the **Garrison Tunnel Project**. This project was conceptualized and developed by the BGHC on behalf of the Bush Hill Tourism Trust and came about after the re-discovery of the tunnels at George Washington House.

Funds were allocated specifically for the construction of stairwells for visitors to GWH to be able to enter the tunnels and walk a 207 foot section, emerging within the garden of the main GHW site. This tunnel attraction is earmarked to become a major component of the GWH attraction.

This year the TDC was approached to sponsor the inaugural Caribbean Conference of National Trusts. The local National Trust recognized that heritage tourism is the fastest growing segment of tourism globally and determined that Barbados could be the leading Caribbean destination and a major competitor. This conference was conceptualized to enrich and produce synergies with the rest of the Caribbean and to produce major media publicity and networks, hopefully creating greater interest and funding for preservation and heritage.

Sports Tourism

As noted, Sports Tourism initiatives received a quarter of the financial year's funding. The six different sporting

initiatives represented were soccer, darts, triathlon, swimming, rugby and golf.

Due to the prevailing economic conditions, the TDC continued to support some long standing sports tourism events such as the **Barbados Masters Football Festival** and the **Barbados Darts Festival**, as these events have undoubtedly proven their ability to continuously attract a large number of visitors who spend money on local accommodation and attractions. For example the Barbados Darts Festival continues to attract darts players, their partners, children and friends who consider this festival as their main holiday in that calendar year and spend quite some time on the island.

Of the newer events to the TDC, the **Pan American Triathlon Confederation (PATCO)**, once again awarded to Bridgetown was co-sponsored by the TDC. This highly sought after Pan American Sprint Triathlon hosts a number of overseas competitors and results in increased island exposure to this segment.



Barbados Open Water Festival

The **Swim Barbados Vacations** was again selected for significant funding due to the extensive coverage it obtained in its inaugural year and the new events earmarked to grow the festival this time around. The TDC is pleased to encourage these new events which attract new sectors to the island.

Rugby Barbados Sevens approached the TDC for funding to assist with their marketing and promotion strategy for their overseas tournament participation. The BRFU viewed this as a significant opportunity to market Brand Barbados at an event that attracted 40 teams and thousands of spectators. The TDC was happy to partner with the Barbados Rugby Federation to work towards the ultimate goal of hosting an international event here.

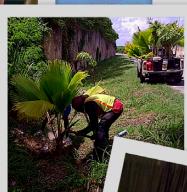

Funds were also allocated for the production of the **Sir Garfield Sobers Golf Video** which features the beauty and elevated ocean views with commentary on our four Championship courses. The video is expected to be distributed initially by the Barbados Tourism Authority through all of its overseas offices in addition to being used by Sir Garfield on his overseas promotional tours. It will also be sent to all golf clubs, posted on websites, etc.

Crime Prevention

The TDC continued to recognize the importance of crime prevention to the stability of the local tourism industry. **The Crime Stoppers International Conference** received TDC funds to sponsor the cost of implementing their PR strategy utilizing online and social media.



A small but important funding project was the **Dodd's Prison's NIFCA Drama**. This drama heightened awareness of the effects of crime on tourism and consequently the lives of all living in Barbados. The Government Information Service filmed the drama for television viewing. Additionally it is envisaged that the DVD would be made available to our 26 secondary schools and other youth centres. TDC congratulated the work done on the drama which went on to win a NIFCA Gold Award.

Epicurean

The TDC joined forces with the BTA to provide significant sponsorship funds to the **Barbados Food and Wine & Rum Festival** which was intended to draw visitors from overseas and highlight our local culinary talent.

Similarly we joined with the BHTA to provide sponsorship funds for **Taste of the Caribbean**. It is envisaged that the development of the epicurean market will continue to draw visitors as these Barbadian Culinary team members continue to represent Barbados locally, regionally and internationally at several events From the Product Development standpoint these events help to produce some of the best Chefs and Bartenders on the island.

Promotion

In Celebration of the **40th Anniversary of Caribbean Week in New York**, TDC funds helped Barbados to participate in the events aimed to increase awareness of the destination and to drive increased business. These activities presented the unique opportunity to expose consumers to the culinary expertise of our Chefs as well as the unique attributes that differentiate Barbados from our competitors. Book Barbados Now was also promoted at this event.

Under the promotions umbrella, the TDC provided some funds towards the **Sporting Barbados Magazine**. Sporting Barbados is a marketing tool for the major sporting events in this island which is distributed to hotels, villas, attractions, clubs, VIP lounges, sports bars and restaurants. In addition it is prominently featured at World Travel Market, the overseas offices and the local BTA office for visiting sporting groups.

Eco-Tourism

The TDC continued to provide platinum sponsorship to the CYEN International Coastal Clean-up which took place on September 21st 2013 and involved close to 600 volunteers who were able to remove 3406 kg of marine debris over a distance of 5.76 km. A much needed exercise indeed.

The TDC partnered with the **Future Centre Trust** to provide sponsorship for the continuation of **Tree Planting** along this Northern side of the ABC Highway. The planting of these trees are intended to beautify and enhance the redeveloped ABC highway from Warrens to Haggatt Hall, a major transportation corridor by way of planting some 750 varietal palm trees. The TDC is proud to be associated with this example of greening in Barbados in support of the country's goals of a 'Green Economy'.

Product Development

The TDC welcomed the opportunity to assist our cruising sector by funding two new signs which were placed inside the Homeport Terminals South and North of the Barbados Port. This was deemed an important project as this new homeport had already processed about 15,000 guests without any 'Welcome to Barbados' signage. Funds were provided for the design, production

and installation of these large, colourful 16 by 8 feet PVC signs.

Additional assistance was lent to the **Barbados Sea Turtle Project** in the form of funds made available for security services during the nesting season for the project workers. Barbados is currently home to the second-largest hawksbill turtle nesting population in the Wider Caribbean, with up to 500 females nesting per year. Previous unfortunate events necessitated this need for continued security.

Conclusion

During this financial year, the Committee was pleased to work with our industry partners, the BHTA and the BTA and assist with the execution of various projects. Our support tends to remain more reactionary than proactive with the notable exception of the Attractions Audit project where a number of our islands premier Attractions were given much needed attention. It is hopeful that in these times where a targeted approach is even more needed that we could be engaged in more strategic funding in order to position ourselves to make significant gains.

The Committee again had the opportunity to host some of the project proposers at our monthly assessment meetings for the purpose of receiving additional clarifications for the projects presented, but also to try to lend expertise to further develop these events and make them more self-sustaining.

This coming year we look forward to reviewing new and exciting proposals submitted to our organization and to continued collaborations with our industry partners. We stand by our commitment to acknowledging all proposals received and thoroughly reviewing them to carefully select those which meet TDC's marketing and product development mandates.

1. Incorporation and principal activity

The Corporation was incorporated on June 10, 1987, as a non-profit organisation. The principal activity of the Corporation is the promotion and development of the Barbados Tourism Industry. The Corporation's principal place of business is located in Bridgetown, St. Michael.

2. Significant accounting policies

(a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements of the Corporation have been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS). The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with IFRS requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the Corporation's accounting policies. Although these estimates are based on management's best knowledge of current events and conditions, actual results could differ from these estimates.

Standards, interpretations and amendments to existing standards effective in the 2014 financial year

There are no standards, interpretations and amendments to existing standards effective in the 2014 financial year which have a significant impact on the Corporation's financial statements.

New standards, amendments and interpretations to existing standards that are not yet effective and have not been early adopted by the Corporation

Management has reviewed the new standards, amendments and interpretations to existing standards that are not yet effective and has determined that there are none which significantly impact the Corporation. The Corporation has not early adopted the new standards, amendments and interpretations.

(b) Members' contributions

Members' contributions are recognised on the cash basis. In view of their voluntary nature, members' contributions in arrears have not been recognised in these financial statements.

(c) Development and promotional expenditure committed

The liability for development and promotional expenditure committed is provided for upon approval by the Board of Directors and commitment to the recipient.

(d) Investment income

Investment income is recognised on the accrual basis.

(e) Plant and equipment

Plant and equipment is stated at historical cost less depreciation.

Depreciation is calculated on a straight line basis, so as to write off the cost of plant and equipment overtheir estimated useful lives as follows:

Leasehold improvements2 yearsComputer equipment3 yearsFurniture and fittings10 yearsOther office equipment10 yearsDonated equipment3 - 10 years

Equipment donated is recorded at cost and credited to income in the year in which the equipment is received. This treatment is not in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards. However, the amount is not considered to be material to the financial statements.

(f) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents represent cash on hand and at bank and loans and receivables with a maturity date of less than ninety days.

(g) Loans and receivables - short and long term fixed deposits

Loans and receivables - short and long term fixed deposits, are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. They are included in current assets, except for maturities greater than 12 months after the balance sheet date. They are carried at amortised cost less provision for impairment.

(h) Foreign currency translation

a) Functional and presentation currency

Items included in the financial statements are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Corporation operates ('the functional currency'). The financial statements are presented in Barbados dollars, which is the Corporation's functional and presentation currency.

b) Transactions and balances

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation at year-end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognised in the statement of comprehensive income.

(i) Trade payables

Trade payables are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

3. Taxation

The Corporation has been registered as a non-profit organisation and is therefore exempt from corporation tax.

16 Financial risk management

The Corporation's activities expose it to a variety of financial risks: market risk (including currency risk, cash flow and fair value interest rate risk and price risk), credit risk and liquidity risk.

a) Market risk

i) Foreign exchange risk

The Corporation's transactions in foreign currencies are mainly for operating expenses. These transactions are denominated mainly in United States dollars. Since there is a fixed exchange rate between the Barbados dollar and the United States dollar there is no significant exposure to foreign exchange risk.

ii) Price risk

The Corporation does not hold any equity securities and as a result is not exposed to equity securities price risk.

iii) Cash flow and fair value interest rate risk

The Corporation's interest rate risk arises from its fixed deposits. The fixed deposits are issued at fixed rates and therefore limit the Corporation's exposure to cash flow interest rate risk. The Corporation is not exposed to fair value interest rate risk.

b) Credit risk

Credit risk arises from the possibility that counterparties may default on their obligations to the Corporation. The amount of the Corporation's maximum exposure to credit risk is indicated by the carrying amount of its financial assets. Credit risk is minimised by the fact that member contributions are not accrued when in arrears. Fixed deposits are placed with regulated financial institutions and reputable public companies within limits set under policy guidelines approved by the Board of Directors.

c) Liquidity risk

The table below analyses the Corporation's financial liabilities into relevant maturity groupings based on the remaining period at the balance sheet date to the contractual maturity date. The amounts disclosed in the table are the contractual undiscounted cash flows. Balances due within 12 months equal their carrying balances as the impact of discounting is not significant. Liquidity risk is managed by the maintenance of adequate short term and long term fixed deposits to meet cash demand. There are no balances due beyond 12 months.

d) Capital risk management

The Corporation's capital is represented by the Accumulated Surplus. The objectives when managing the Accumulated Surplus are to safeguard the Corporation's ability to continue as a going concern in order to maintain the promotion of the Barbados Tourism Industry.

In order to maintain or adjust the Accumulated Surplus, the Corporation may appeal to members for increased contributions and at the same time control operating costs.

e) Fair value of financial assets and liabilities

The fair values of financial assets and liabilities are not considered to be materially different from their carrying amounts.

Fair value estimates are made at a specific point in time, based on market conditions and information about the financial instrument. These estimates are subjective in nature and involve uncertainties and matters of significant judgement and therefore, cannot be determined with precision. Changes in assumptions could significantly affect the estimates. Non-financial instruments such as plant and equipment are excluded from fair value disclosure. Thus the total fair value amounts cannot be aggregated to determine the underlying economic value of the Corporation.
