OUR HISTORICAL TREASURES

GUN HILL SIGNAL STATION

This Report is dedicated to Heritage Tourism and features one of the island's historical treasures - Gun Hill Signal Station, built in 1818 and lovingly restored by the Barbados National Trust with the assistance of the Tourism Development Corporation.

HISTORY - From The Barbados National Trust:

Gun Hill is the finest of a chain of stations used to signal the approach of enemy ships, the safe arrival of cargo ships and to help in the internal security of the island. It is one of a series of six signal stations which were built and used as rallying points in the event of civil disorder and also for non-military purposes.

The station is strategically placed on the highland of St. George and commands a magnificent view from East through South to the West – a perfect location! This signal station was restored by the Trust in 1982 and opened to the public. The rooms at the back of the signal tower are filled with an interesting collection of memorabilia from the military.


Interesting functions of Gun Hill Signal Station:

It was used to convey information about meeting of the Council of Barbados. This was executed by the appropriate combination of flags on a Signal Staf at Government House and repeated almost immediately at the other signal stations.

Gun Hill is hexagonal and indicates that it was rebuilt - the structure varied from tower to tower. The stations were built to accommodate two persons and the slits in the walls enabled them to communicate quickly with their sister stations.

TDC's Directors and working committee members are senior business executives who serve voluntarily in order to stimulate ideas and provide commercial insight for the development of the tourism industry.

The members of the TDC are considered to be its shareholders who provide the organization's working capital and resources. While the TDC's 'shareholders' do not receive the traditional dividend return on their investment, the TDC places a high priority on providing its members with a return through the growth of the tourism industry which is essential if we are to sustain our accustomed standard of living in Barbados. Financial contributions to the TDC are fully tax deductible for corporate income tax purposes.

The PAC Report

The TDC continued its funding efforts on a wide range of projects to enhance the Barbados tourism product in conjunction with the BHTA, BTMI and the MOT. The Project Assessment Committee (PAC) received an increase in requests for funding for Beautification projects across the island and we have put measures in place to answer this call.

BEAUTIFICATION 22.5%

The TDC assisted the Barbados Amateur Swimming Association with extensive refurbishment of the Aquatic Centre Facility. This refurbishment made a significant improvement to the Carifta and CCCAN swim meets that were hosted by Barbados this year. Further assistance was also given to the NCC for the refurbishment and beautification of its bathroom facilities at Barclays Park, Oistins, Worthing and Accra Beach. We also funded the upgrades to Hastings Rocks with new uPVC fencing. Additionally, Bridgetown and Jubilee Gardens now have fully refurbished lamp posts and light fittings, which provide increased safety both for our citizens and tourist alike.

ECO TOURISM

The TDC continued funding for Phase 3 of its partnership with the Future Centre Trust and completed the Tree Planting project along the ABC highway on the stretch between the Simpson Motors round-a-bout to the Spring Garden Highway. The TDC also assisted the NCC by providing essential lifeguard equipment and also refurbishing four lifeguard huts at Brandons, Batts Rock, Browns North (Copacabana), Browns South (Carlisle Bay Parking Area) and Dover. These facilities required much needed repairs.

SAFETY 10%

The TDC funded three additional phases of CCTV camera installations to assist and support the Royal Barbados Police Force on the West Coast of the island, Maxwell and Carlisle Bay on the South Coast. Further funding was given for the refurbishment of the St. Lawrence Gap light poles and the replacement of all of the light bulbs from Café Sol to Sandals. These improvements are essential as they provide safety for everyone at this popular tourist spot. We also provided funding for the painting of zebra crossings and road markings across the island to assist the Ministry of Transport and Works

HISTORICAL 2.5%

One of our mandates is to improve the beauty of our historical landmarks and as such, we provided funding on the external refurbishment of the East Point Lighthouse.

EVENTS & FESTIVALS 7.5%

The TDC partnered with the Celtic Festival for the first time. This vibrant music and food festival has a reputation for being fun in the sun. It delivers a return to the Barbados economy through visitor numbers, media coverage and social media exposure. The 6th Barbados Jazz Excursion a weekend of concerts, island excursions and charity golf in Barbados - Columbus weekend was supported once again by the TDC.

SPORTS 37.5%

The TDC continue to increase funding for Sporting events and some of these in the past financial year are:

- Barbados Rugby World 7s with a focus of increasing the number of women's teams for 2019.
- BFIT 2019 Season with triathletes visiting Barbados to participate in their various events.
- One Movement Invitational Skate Contest 2019 was held at the new Maria Holder Skate Park for the first time.
- Sol Rally Autosport Promotion.
- Run Barbados seeing a growth of overseas participants.
- Barbados Open Water Festival increasing in popularity each year.



PROMOTIONS 15%

IMEX: The Executive Director of the TDC attended IMEX in Las Vegas to manage the stand. The TDC is proud to be instrumental in the creation of the new Barbados IMEX stand.


ITB: The TDC supported ITB held in Berlin for the first time and Barbados now has flights coming from Germany with Lufthansa.

Our opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of **Tourism Development Corporation ("the Corporation")** as at March 31, 2019, and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with the International Financial Reporting Standard for Small and Medium-sized Entities (the IFRS for SMEs).

Basis for opinion

We are independent of the Corporation in accordance with the International Ethics Standards Board for Accountants' Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (IESBA Code). We have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the IESBA Code.

Responsibilities of management and those charged with governance for the financial statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with the IFRS for SMEs, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Corporation's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Corporation or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Corporation's financial reporting process.

Auditor's responsibilities for the audit of the financial statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. I. Incorporation and principal activity

The Corporation was incorporated on June 10, 1987, as a non-profit organisation. The principal activity of the Corporation is the promotion and development of the Barbados Tourism Industry. The Corporation's principal place of business is located in Belleville, St. Michael.

2. Significant accounting policies

(a) Basis of preparation

This is the first set of financial statements prepared by the Corporation in accordance with IFRS for SMEs under the historical cost convention.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with IFRS for SMEs requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires management to exercise its judgement in the process of applying the Corporation's accounting policies. Although these estimates are based on management's best knowledge of current events and conditions, actual results could differ from these estimates.

(b) Members' contributions

Members' contributions are recognised on the cash basis. In view of their voluntary nature, members' contributions in arrears have not been recognised in these financial statements.

(c) Development and promotional expenditure committed

The liability for development and promotional expenditure committed is provided for upon approval by the Board of Directors and commitment to the recipient.

(d) Investment income

Investment income is recognised on the accrual basis.

(e) Plant and equipment

All plant and equipment is stated at historical cost less depreciation. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Company and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. The carrying amount of the replaced part is derecognised. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the statement of comprehensive loss during the financial period in which they are incurred.

Plant and equipment...continued

Depreciation on assets is calculated using the straight-line method to allocate their cost to their residual values over their estimated useful lives, as follows:

Leasehold improvements	2 years
Computer equipment	3 years
Furniture and fittings	10 years
Other office equipment	10 years
Donated equipment	3 - 10 years

The assets' residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at each balance sheet date.

An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing the proceeds with the carrying amount and are recognised in the statement of comprehensive loss.

(f) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents represent cash on hand and at bank and loans and receivables with a maturity date of less than ninety days.

(g) Short and long term fixed deposits

Short and long term fixed deposits, are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. They are included in current assets, except for maturities greater than 12 months after the balance sheet date. They are initially measured at the transaction price and at the end of each reporting period, they are carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method less provision for impairment.

(h) Foreign currency translation

a) Functional and presentation currency

Items included in the financial statements are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the Corporation operates ('the functional currency'). The financial statements are presented in Barbados dollars, which is the Corporation's functional and presentation currency.

Foreign currency translation ... continued

b) Transactions and balances

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation at year-end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognised in the statement of comprehensive loss.

(i) Trade payables

Trade payables are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

3. Taxation

The Corporation has been registered as a non-profit organisation and is therefore exempt from corporation tax.
